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1. CALL TO ORDER - ROLL CALL

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Interim Chief Probation Officer Mark Hake at 1:33 p.m.

Mark Hake advised that Chief of Police Dave Brown has requested to step down as the Police agencies committee member representative. Chief of Police Frank Coe will replace him as the Police agencies representative for the Community Corrections Partnership Executive Committee.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mark Hake entertained a motion to approve the minutes of the Community Corrections Partnership Executive Committee (CCPEC) meeting from February 5, 2013 (handout). Motion was moved by Paul Zellerbach, and seconded by Brian Boles. Mark Hake requested a roll call vote of the motion which passed as follows:

3. ACCEPTANCE AND APPROVAL OF 2012/13 FISCAL REPORTS

Administrative Services Manager Doug Moreno briefly reviewed the *FY 2012/13 Period 2 Financial Report – Summary of Expenditures (Schedule A) and the individual CCPEC Agency Financial Reports* provided by each department except for the District Attorney's report which was unavailable. Assistant District Attorney Jeff Van Wagenen explained that there were inconsistencies within their report that needed to be corrected. The District Attorney's office will submit the first three quarters of the year report on April 15<sup>th</sup> when the next Financial Report Period 3 is due.

Mark Hake entertained a motion to accept the Fiscal Procedures Work Group recommended motion #1 to receive and file the FY 2012/13 Period 2 Financial Report – Summary of Expenditures (Schedule A) and the individual CCPEC Agency Financial Reports (handout). 4. CCPEC MEASURABLE GOALS WORK GROUP UPDATE

Andrea Greer provided the *Measurable Goals Work Group Memo* (handout) dated March 5, 2013. The work group last met on February 15<sup>th</sup> and discussed the need to establish a countywide definition of recidivism. The differing definitions were discussed amongst the committee members. The next tentative work group meeting date is March 14<sup>th</sup>.

5. 2012/13 AB 109 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN UPDATE

Mark Hake thanked everyone on their diligence and hard work with meeting the tight deadlines for preparing the 2012/13 AB 109 Implementation Plan. Copies of the Form 11 and Implementation Plan will be distributed to the committee and available to the public after being filed at the clerk's office.

6. POLICE AGENCIES ALLOCATION UPDATE

Frank Coe stated that there is no update at this time.

7. REALIGNMENT RELATED 2013 PENDING LEGISLATION

Mark Hake provided pending legislation related to realignment (handout).

a) **PROBATION:** Chief Deputy Probation Officer Andrea Greer reviewed and discussed the *AB 109 Status Report* dated March 5, 2013. She reviewed the status report as follows:

Steve Steinberg will provide more information regarding how many people are being referred to or served by Mental Health as well as the Substance Abuse numbers.
- d) **POLICE:** Frank Coe provided an update on the current Post-release Accountability and Compliance Team (PACT) report, as follows:

- e) **DISTRICT ATTORNEY:** Paul Zellerbach reported that his office is in the process of working with the Sheriff's Department in creating a program to track all of the Fed-kicks. He also mentioned that Parole Revocation Hearings will be in effect as of July 1<sup>st</sup>.
- f) **PUBLIC DEFENDER:** Brian Boles stated that a meeting was held with the Riverside partners to discuss the Parole Revocation Hearings. He will keep the committee apprised of any further updates.
- g) **COURT:** No report at this time.

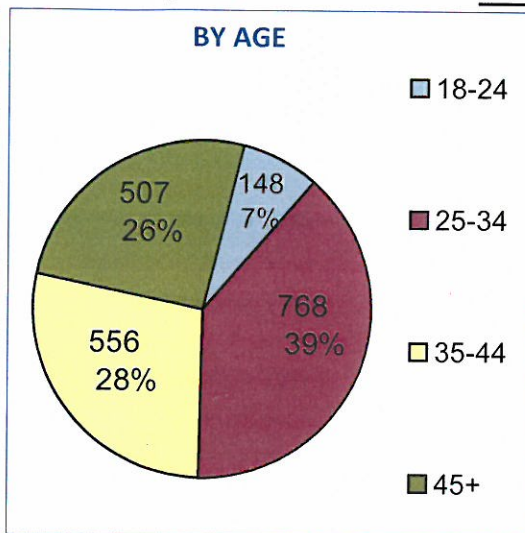
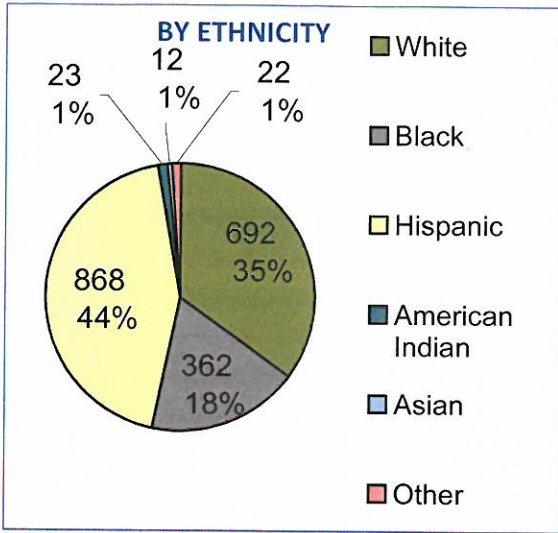

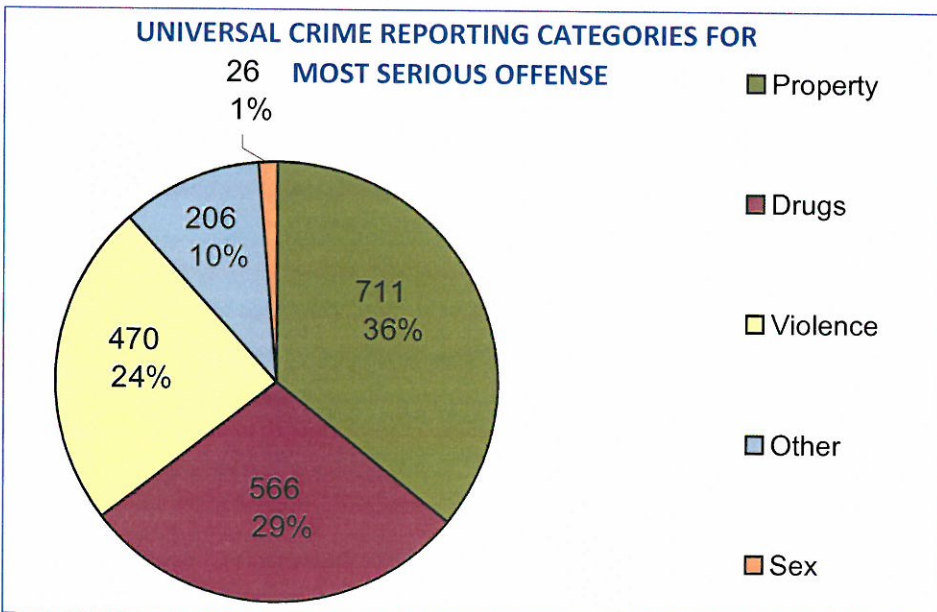

RE: AB 109 Impact Update

Since State Prison Realignment under AB 109 went into effect, the jails in Riverside County have experienced a substantial increase in inmate population. As of this morning, our jail population stood at 3,716 inmates, or 97% percent of our maximum capacity (3,842 beds). In the first week of January 2012, our facilities hit maximum capacity, requiring us to initiate releases pursuant to a federal court order to relieve overcrowding. These types of releases have continued since that time. Last year, 6,990 inmates were released per the court order. 2,160 inmates have been released year-to-date for 2013 per the court order.

Inmate bookings since AB 109 went into effect which are directly related to realignment are:

**Parole Violations (3056 PC)**

Total booked to date is 6,760 (4,482 booked for violation only; 2,278 had additional charges)

The number of inmates currently in custody serving a parole violation only is 176.

**Flash Incarcerations (3454 PC)**

Total booked to date is 712. The number of these inmates currently in custody is 13.

**Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) Violations (3455 PC)**

Total booked to date is 1,544 (808 booked for a violation only; 736 had additional charges).

The number of inmates currently in custody serving a PRCS violation only is 148.

**Inmates Sentenced under 1170(h) PC for Felony Sentence to be served in County Jail**

The total number of inmates sentenced per 1170(h) PC is 2,655.

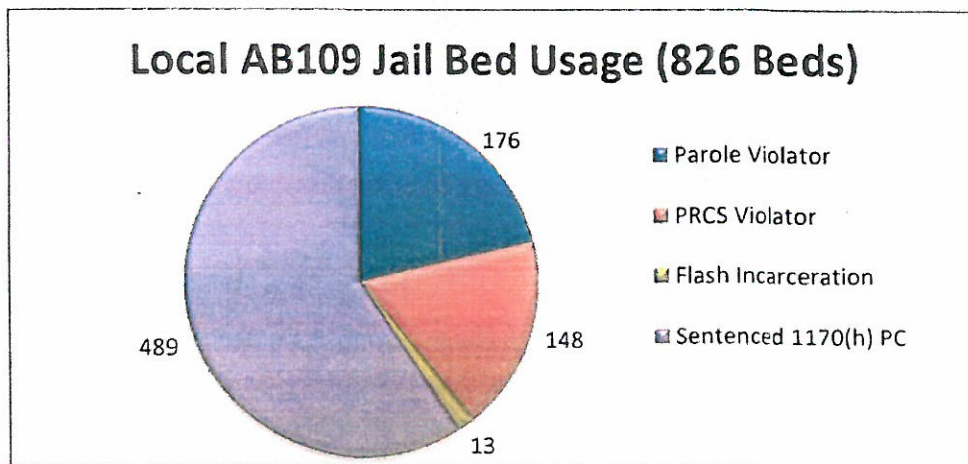
The number of these inmates that remain in custody is 489, or about 13.2% of the total jail population.

196 of these inmates have been sentenced to 3 years or more, with the longest local sentence standing at 12 years, 8 months.

**Summary**

The total number of inmates to date booked directly or sentenced to jail due to realignment is 8,657.

The number of those currently in custody is 826, or approximately 22.2% the total jail population.

### PRE-SENTENCE REFERRAL PROCESS FOR ATTORNEYS

  - a) Contact Detention Mental Health Services staff per jail to coordinate a screening via the AB 109 Referral form which needs to include :
    - (1) Next Court Date
    - (2) Case #
    - (3) Booking #
  - b) Detention MH staff will complete screening to include MH, Substance Abuse, Housing, and Transportation  
and Release of Information to Public Defender
  - c) Detention MH staff will provide Public Defender results of screening within 10 business days – Need Public Defender's Address/FAX
  - d) Detention MH staff will coordinate with AB 109 Outpatient clinic staff to follow up for services upon release

**Transition to AB 109 Outpatient Services:**

### AB 109 Housing

Riverside County Mental Health and Probation developed a collaborative process to provide two housing options for the realigned population.

- Re-entry – 1 to 30 days housing, renewable weekly, referred through Riverside County Probation
  - RFP completed
  - Program started March 8<sup>th</sup>, 2013
- Transitional – 1 month to 4 months, up to 6 months, referred through Riverside County Probation
  - RFQ process continuing
  - Projection for program start up for this housing type is 1-2 months

Emergency packets for food and hygiene care will be provided to offenders in re-entry housing; food and hygiene care will also be provided for those in transitional housing if needed.

### A Hopeful Future

- New ways of assessment and case planning:
  - In custody assessment 30-90 days prior to release
  - Start to develop the case plan
  - DRC mandated for the orientation of the offender
  - Would allow for direct pickup from jail to re-entry housing
- Re-engage Public Health to provide mobile health care assistance, or on site treatment
- Second DRC will be located in the desert region-next fiscal year
